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## Tattnall County Solid Waste Management Plan

### I. Introduction

Tattnall County is located in the southeastern region of the State of Georgia. Created by a State Legislative act in 1801, Tattnall County is a community with an overall population that is experiencing some growth. Located approximately six miles south of Interstate 16 along U.S. Highway 280, Tattnall County has good transportation routes connecting the county to several of Georgia's major cities. These transportation routes serve as major thoroughfares through Tattnall County. Many motorists traveling west to east from Columbus to Savannah utilize State Route 30 /U.S. 280 as an efficient means of transportation. State Route 73/U.S. 25/301 also serves as a quick and efficient route to reach Florida and South Carolina, and it was once a major north-south tourist route prior to the development of the Interstate system. The county is part of the ongoing efforts to revive State Route 121 as the "Woodpecker Trail," which has achieved formal designation by the state legislature. Once known as "the shortest route to Florida's West Coast," the route is being touted as a welcome interstate alternative to north-south travelers from Florida to South Carolina. State Route 57 is considered a shortcut from I-16 to I-95, especially for intrastate travelers from Atlanta to the Golden Isles. The route has been formally designated and signed by the Georgia Department of Transportation as the "Wiregrass Trail." With an estimated 2003 population of 22,385, the county's population increased 23.4 percent from 1980 to 2003. In 2000, the number of occupied housing units was 7,057. A vast majority of Tattnall County's land area consists of agriculture and forestland (approximately 94 percent). The largest employer in Tattnall County is the Georgia Department of Corrections. There are three state prison facilities located in Tattnall County. They are Rogers State Prison (Reidsville), Smith State Prison (Glennville), and Georgia State Prison (Reidsville). Combined, they employ 1,389 people. Much of Tattnall County's population growth since 1980 can be attributed to the growth of these facilities. The largest commercial employer is Rotary Corporation (Glennville), which employs 445 people. There are two other commercial industries located in Tattnall County that employ 50 or more people. Duramatic Products and Manufacturing Company employs 125 and Mascot

Pecan Company employs 50 people. This makes the Georgia Department of Corrections a critical employer for an economy in Tattnall County that is still fairly dependent upon agriculture and forestry uses.

Tattnall County has five incorporated cities, and all are participating in this solid waste plan. The City of Reidsville is the county seat of Tattnall County. Its estimated 2003 population was 2,291. The City of Cobbtown had an estimated 2003 population of 310. The City of Collins had an estimated 2003 population of 528. The City of Glennville had an estimated 2003 population of 4,859. The City of Manassas had an estimated 2003 population of 100.

## **II. Waste Disposal Stream Analysis**

### **A. Inventory of Waste Stream Generators**

Contributing to the overall waste stream in the unincorporated areas of Tattnall County are households, institutions, and commercial businesses, along with minimal contributions from a couple of industries. These sectors contribute different items such as paper, plastic, brown goods, food, and commercial waste. It is estimated that approximately 65 percent of the materials is household garbage, 20 percent is institutional (such as Georgia, Rogers, and Smith State Prisons), 10 percent is commercial, and industry is five percent.

In the City of Cobbtown, households, commercial businesses, and industries contribute to the overall waste stream. These sectors contribute different items such as paper, plastic, brown goods, food, and commercial waste. Households contribute approximately 90 percent of the overall waste stream. Commercial businesses contribute roughly five percent. A small number of industries throughout the city contribute approximately five percent as well.

In the City of Collins, households, two schools, commercial businesses, and industries contribute to the overall waste stream. These sectors contribute different items such as paper, plastic, brown goods, food, and commercial waste. Households contribute approximately 80 percent of the overall waste stream. The two schools in Collins contribute approximately 10 percent.

Commercial businesses contribute roughly five percent. A small number of industries throughout the city contribute approximately five percent as well.

Contributing to the overall waste stream in the City of Glennville are households, commercial businesses, and institutions, along with minimal contributions from a few industries. These sectors contribute different items such as paper, plastic, brown goods, food, and commercial waste. It is estimated that approximately 70 percent of the materials is household garbage, 15 percent is commercial, 10 percent is institutional (Tattnall County Schools, Smith State Prison), and industry is five percent.

In the City of Manassas, households and one institution contribute to the overall waste stream. These sectors contribute paper, plastics, food, and glass. Households contribute approximately 95 percent of the waste stream. Pineland Mental Health, an institution, contributes approximately five percent.

In the City of Reidsville, households, a few commercial businesses, and a couple of institutions contribute to the overall waste stream. These sectors contribute paper, plastics, and food. Households contribute approximately 80 percent of the waste stream. A few commercial businesses and institutions (Rogers and Georgia State Prisons) contribute approximately 10 percent each to the overall waste stream.

#### **B. Anticipated Waste Amounts**

Several steps were required to determine the amount of municipal solid waste that is generated in Tattnall County in terms of pounds per person per day through the years of 2003 to 2015. First, the total population for the county was projected from 2004 through 2015. Once the population was projected, the amount of waste that was disposed of by Tattnall County and its municipalities from 2000-2003 was recorded for each year. The amount of municipal solid waste that was generated each year (2000-2003) was then divided by population estimates from 2000-2003 to get a per capita amount of municipal solid waste. It was then decided to utilize the highest per capita number (0.106 in 2000) to avoid being overly conservative. Then, the 2000 per capita number was utilized to get a constant rate of the amount of solid waste disposed for the remaining years of the per capita municipal solid waste

generated. Thus, it was assumed that the annual rate of growth would remain consistent in order to best produce a reasonable estimate.

To determine the total tonnage disposed, the projected population for each year (2004-2015) was then multiplied by the highest per capita number (0.106 in 2000) to determine an amount disposed for each year. This number resulted in the total projected number of tons of municipal solid waste disposed of in Tattnall County for 2003-2015.

The total number of recyclables collected each year in Tattnall County is not estimated to be large enough to warrant projections. Citizens drop off newspapers at one of the four drop-off sites throughout Tattnall County; however, the amount accumulated is estimated to not reach one ton in total capacity each year. Therefore, estimates are not warranted.

The total tonnage of disposed waste for each year was determined to be the total amount of waste generated per year, because the recyclables were not estimated. That total was then divided by 365 to get the total tons per day. Next, the total tons per day were multiplied by 2,000 (2,000 lbs. equals one ton) to get the total pounds per day. That total was then divided by the projected population to get the total pounds per person per day of waste generated. The estimated numbers are given for each year beginning in 2003 through 2015 in Table 1.

The composition of the municipal solid waste generated each year from 2003-2015 is also broken down in tons based upon the GA DCA state figure during the Fall of 2003 through the Summer of 2004. The figures for Tattnall County are assumed to be the same as the state figures because no figures were available at the local level. The estimated composition of solid waste for each year is given from 2003 through 2015 in Table 2.

### **III. Waste Reduction Element**

#### **A. Inventory of Current Waste Reduction and Recycling Programs**

As a part of the State of Georgia's efforts to reduce the per capita amount of waste disposed, Tattnall County and its municipalities have minimal recycling activities at best. Citizens drop off newspapers at a few sites located throughout Tattnall County. Newspapers are picked up by the Tattnall/Evans County Training Center for packaging purposes. The amount accumulated for newspapers is estimated to not reach one ton in total capacity per year as previously mentioned. The Tattnall County recycling program targets all residents of Tattnall County and encourages the recycling of items through proper disposal. This program has had only limited success since its inception due to funding issues resulting from a small tax base. The County continuously needs to look for additional funding and other ways to expand the program to achieve its 25 percent waste reduction goal.

#### **B. Source Reduction**

Tattnall County and its municipalities do not have any formal waste reduction programs through such means as reuse programs, financial incentives, waste audits, waste exchanges, or industrial process changes at this time.

#### **C. Recycling**

Tattnall County has developed a small recycling and collection program for the County and its municipalities, but with limited effectiveness. The County has established various sites for newspaper drop off. The program is not very large at the present time and needs to be expanded.

### **IV. Yard Trimming Mulching/Composting**

#### **A. Inventory of Composting and Mulching Programs**

Tattnall County does not have a composting/mulching program. The County encourages its citizens to take their yard trimmings to the mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The site at Rogers State Prison is funded and maintained by the prison. Inmates are utilized for the upkeep of the site. Processed yard trimmings are used for mulch throughout the prison site in flower beds and

wherever needed. The cities of Glennville and Manassas do not have a composting/mulching program, nor do they have an everyday curbside pickup that collects yard trimmings. The cities do encourage citizens to take their yard trimmings to the mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Cobbtown does have a composting/mulching program. The City provides curbside pickup as needed, and households can voluntarily take their compost/mulch to the compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Cobbtown does not charge a fee for collection, and the city takes the yard trimmings it collects to Rogers State Prison. The City of Collins also has a composting/mulching program. The City provides curbside pickup once per week, and households can voluntarily take their compost/mulch to the compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Collins does not charge a fee for collection, and the city takes the yard trimmings it collects to Rogers State Prison. The City of Reidsville does have a composting/mulching program. The City provides curbside pickup once per week, and households can voluntarily take their compost/mulch to the compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Reidsville does not charge a fee for collection, and the city takes the yard trimmings it collects to Rogers State Prison. The site at Rogers State Prison is funded and maintained by the prison. Inmates are utilized for the upkeep of the site. Processed yard trimmings are used for mulch throughout the prison site in flower beds and wherever needed.

#### **B. Special Management Items**

Tattnall County has convenience centers located in three of its cities, Collins, Glennville, and Reidsville. Citizens may utilize any of the convenience centers voluntarily to drop off various special management items. Tattnall County has an area designated at each of the three sites for citizens to voluntarily drop off their batteries. Once a significant amount of batteries is collected, the County will contact Sullivan Environmental Services to collect the batteries. The batteries are taken to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill in Wayne County. One of the major regional landfills in the state of Georgia, Broadhurst is a private commercial landfill for municipal solid waste that accepts waste from various parts of the state. Plans are currently underway to expand the facility to increase its capacity beyond the estimated 14 years that it has remaining. The

landfill presently totals 900 acres, but future plans call for the purchase of an additional 1,500 acres to expand its operations.

There is an area designated for white goods at each of the three sites that citizens may utilize voluntarily to drop off those items. Sullivan Environmental Services collects the white goods, and they are taken to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill in Wayne County to properly dispose of them. There is also a roll-off container located at each of the sites to collect couches and various types of furniture if citizens wish to voluntarily bring them. The County contacts Sullivan Environmental Services to collect the couches and other items and properly dispose of them. There is also a container located at each of the three sites for citizens to properly dispose of tires. Once a significant amount of tires are collected, the County contacts Ridge Recyclers, Inc. out of Johnston, South Carolina to collect the tires and properly dispose of them. The cities of Tattnall County do not have a program of their own to collect any of the aforementioned items. Citizens are encouraged to utilize one of the three county sites for voluntary drop-off. The county nor the municipalities charge a fee for these centers.

### **C. Waste Reduction Assessment**

Current waste reduction programs in Tattnall County are not adequate to achieve the state's per capita and local waste disposal reduction goals. While the programs are somewhat successful at best, more funding is needed to expand the program to achieve the State of Georgia's waste reduction goals and the local goal of 25 percent for Tattnall County.

### **D. Waste Reduction Needs:**

1. Citizens of Tattnall County need to utilize the three sites located in Collins, Glennville, or Reidsville to collect and properly dispose of batteries, white goods, tires, and furniture.
2. There is a need to implement recycling activities county-wide.

3. Citizens of Tattnall County's municipalities need to continue to utilize the collection program of special management items provided by the County.

4. A need exists to develop a program county-wide to handle the collection and proper disposal of yard trimmings.

**Waste Reduction Goals:**

1. The County and its municipalities need to implement a recycling program and target the collection of various items for recycling.

2. Develop a county-wide composting/mulching program to increase per capita reduction of waste disposal.

**V. Collection Element**

**A. Inventory of Current Solid Waste and Recyclable Collection Programs**

At the present time, Tattnall County contracts with Sullivan Environmental Services out of Vidalia to collect solid waste for rural residents of the county. Sullivan utilizes curbside pickup to collect household garbage once per week. The county charges a fee of \$9.06 per container per month for collection.

Once the garbage is collected, it is taken to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill. Broadhurst has a capacity to operate for 14 more years. Its remaining capacity is 11,298,034.00 cubic yards. As mentioned earlier, Broadhurst is currently seeking to expand its operation. The City of Cobbtown contracts with Sullivan for curbside pickup once a week for a fee of \$6.00 per month. Once the garbage is collected, it is taken by Sullivan to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to the Broadhurst Environmental Landfill. The City of Collins contracts with Sullivan for curbside pickup once per week to collect their solid waste at a rate of \$10.00 per container per month. Sullivan takes the collected garbage to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental, Inc. Landfill. The City of Glennville contracts with Sullivan for curbside pickup once per week to collect their solid waste at a rate of \$9.06 per container per month. Sullivan takes the collected garbage to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill. Tattnall County, through Sullivan Environmental, provides the City of Manassas with curbside pickup once per week to collect their solid waste at a rate of \$9.06 per

container per month. Sullivan takes the collected garbage to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill. The City of Reidsville contracts with Sullivan for curbside pickup once per week to collect their solid waste at a rate of \$9.10 per container per month. Sullivan takes the collected garbage to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill.

Citizens in Tattnall County may also contract with Sullivan on an individual basis for private solid waste containers. The fee for the containers is based on the size of the container. See Attachment B of the solid waste management plan for a cost list of each size of container. A large roll-off container is also available for \$200.00. Sullivan picks up the private containers on a call basis. If the container is located in an unincorporated area of Tattnall County, citizens are billed by Sullivan. If the container is located in an incorporated area of Tattnall County, then the municipality where it is located bills the customer. Solid waste that is collected from the private containers is carried by Sullivan to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill.

Tattnall County has an area designated at each of the three convenience center sites for citizens to voluntarily drop off their batteries. Once a significant amount of batteries is collected, the County will contact Sullivan Environmental Services to collect the batteries. The batteries are taken to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill in Wayne County. There is an area designated for white goods at each of the three sites that citizens may utilize voluntarily to drop off those items. Sullivan Environmental Services collects the white goods and takes them to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to Broadhurst Environmental Landfill in Wayne County to properly dispose of them. There is also a roll-off container located at each of the sites to collect couches and various types of furniture if citizens wish to voluntarily bring them. The County contacts Sullivan Environmental Services to collect the couches and other items and properly dispose of them. There is also a container located at each of the three sites for citizens to properly dispose of tires. Once a significant amount of tires is collected, the County contracts with Ridge Recyclers, Inc. out of Johnston, South Carolina to collect the tires and properly dispose of them. The

cities of Tattnall County do not have a program of their own to collect any of the aforementioned items. Citizens are encouraged to utilize one of the three county sites for voluntary drop-off. Neither the County nor the municipalities charge a fee for these centers to encourage citizens to utilize them to help meet the local reduction goal of 25 percent.

#### **B. Yard Trimmings Collection**

Tattnall County does not have a composting/mulching program. The County encourages its citizens to take their yard trimmings to the mulch site at Rogers State Prison near Reidsville. The site at the prison is funded and maintained by the Georgia Department of Corrections for citizen as well as municipal usage. The cities of Glennville and Manassas do not have a composting/mulching program, nor do they have an everyday curbside pickup that collects yard trimmings. The cities do encourage citizens to take their yard trimmings to the mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Cobbtown does have a composting/mulching program. The City provides curbside pickup as needed, and households can voluntarily take their compost/mulch to the compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Cobbtown does not charge a fee for collection, and the City takes the yard trimmings it collects to Rogers State Prison. The City of Collins also has a composting/mulching program. The City provides curbside pickup once per week, and households can voluntarily take their compost/mulch to the compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison. The City of Collins does not charge a fee for collection, and the City takes the yard trimmings it collects to Rogers State Prison. The City of Reidsville does have a composting/mulching

### **C. Adequacy of Collection Programs**

The collection methods utilized to collect solid waste by Tattnall County and its municipalities are adequate to serve the citizens of Tattnall County. With several regional landfills located in close proximity to Tattnall County, the accessibility of a landfill for solid waste collection purposes by the local governments is adequate. A county-wide program to collect recyclables and meet local reduction goals is needed, as mentioned earlier. A county-wide program to collect composting/mulching needs to be developed as funds become available. The cities of Tattnall County utilize the newspaper drop-off sites located throughout the county for the collection of newspapers. The cities of Tattnall County do not have a program in place to collect special management items. However, citizens may take their items to the drop-off sites located throughout the county.

### **D. Illegal Dumping**

There currently is a problem in Tattnall County with illegal dumping. The County utilizes the sheriff's department and Georgia Department of Natural Resources to combat the problem of illegal dumping. There currently is no codes enforcement program in effect in the county, although a previous program was discontinued due to a lack of funding. A lack of available funding at the local and state levels has prevented such a program from being resumed. While there are few instances of illegal dumping occurring in the City of Cobbtown at this time, if it should happen, the City utilizes the sheriff's department to combat the problem(s). While there are few instances of illegal dumping occurring in the City of Collins at this time, if it should happen, the City utilizes the sheriff's department to combat the problem(s). The City of Collins also has a user agreement through its water department to reduce illegal dumping and other eyesores in the city. The City will not allow any property that is about to be acquired, resided on, or sold to be unclean. The City Water Superintendent will send a letter to the individual who is acquiring, residing on, or selling the property that gives that person 10 days to

get the property cleaned up or the water will either not be turned off or will not be turned on, according to the situation. Illegal dumping is a problem in the City of Glennville, and when it occurs the City relies on its police department to correct the problem(s). While there are few instances of illegal dumping occurring in the City of Manassas at this time, if it should happen, the City utilizes the sheriff's department to combat the problem(s). Illegal dumping is a problem in the City of Reidsville, and when it occurs the City relies on its police department to correct the problem(s).

**E. Collection Needs:**

1. Continue current means of collecting solid waste in the unincorporated areas of the county and encourage the increased utilization of recycling by all citizens.
2. Tattall County needs to investigate the feasibility of establishing a collection program for recycling.
3. A need exists to develop a program county-wide to handle the collection and proper disposal of yard trimmings.

**Collection Goals:**

1. Implement a method of collection and voluntary drop-off of recyclables county-wide.
2. Continue the current method of collection and voluntary drop-off of special management items county-wide.
3. The County needs to develop a county-wide collection program for compost/mulch.
4. The County and its municipalities need to support maintaining compost/mulch site at Rogers State Prison.

**F. Contingency Strategy**

In case of a natural disaster or another event that may interrupt the flow of garbage pickup, Tattall County and its municipalities have an agreement

with Sullivan Environmental Services so that there is no interruption in solid waste pickup. The county and municipalities may also utilize nearby local governments to have access to solid waste collection equipment, if an excessive amount of waste is generated. If one or more of these options were necessary to adequately serve Tattnall County, the local governments would be required to go through the proper procedures to be able to put the options into operation. The time frame required would probably require at least one week to be able to go through the proper procedures to continue solid waste collection. If the collection program should become interrupted in case of a natural disaster or other event, the public will be notified on what procedures will take place via the media. This notification will take place through local newspapers and public service announcements on local radio stations.

## **VI. Disposal Element**

### **A. Disposal**

The Broadhurst Environmental Landfill is a private commercial solid waste landfill located in Wayne County. According to GA EPD, in 2004, Broadhurst Environmental Landfill had a remaining capacity of 11,298,034.0 cubic yards. Its average daily tons in 2004 were 1,901.0, and it has a rate of fill of 2,535.00 cubic yards per day. Its estimated fill date is September 14<sup>th</sup>, 2019, which means that the landfill has approximately 14 years of remaining capacity. Broadhurst accepts items ranging from household wastes to hazardous waste. The facility is currently 902 acres, but expansion plans are to increase its size by 1,500 acres.

### **B. Thermal Treatment Technologies**

Tattnall County and its municipalities do not have any thermal treatment technologies, nor are any planned in the future.

### **C. Adequacy for Planning Period**

The Broadhurst Environmental Landfill will be adequate to meet the needs of Tattnall County and its municipalities for the ten-year planning period. The remaining capacity as of 2004 was 11,298,034.0 cubic yards, or an estimated life of 14 more years. Plans are currently underway to expand the facility as previously mentioned.

**D. Disposal Needs:**

1. Continue to utilize the Broadhurst Environmental Landfill or other regional landfill facilities.

**Disposal Goals:**

1. Continue to utilize the current method of solid waste disposal throughout the county to meet local reduction goals.

**E. Assurance of Ten-year Disposal Capacity (See Attachment A)**

Continue to utilize the current method of solid waste disposal throughout the county.

**F. Contingency Strategy for Disposal**

In case of a natural disaster or another event that may interrupt the flow of garbage pickup or generate a large amount of extra waste, Tattnall County and its municipalities have access to a number of regional landfill facilities in close proximity to Tattnall County to handle the excess waste that such an event might generate. These facilities are located in Candler, Laurens, Telfair, Toombs, and Wayne counties. If this option becomes necessary, the County would be required to go through the proper procedures to be able to put this option into operation. The time frame would probably require at least one week to follow all proper procedures to continue solid waste disposal. If the recycling program should become interrupted in case of a natural disaster or other event, the public will be notified on what procedures will take place via the media. This notification will take place through local newspapers and public service announcements on local radio stations.

**VII. Land Limitation Element**

**A. Natural Environmental Limitations**

Tattnall County's abundant natural resources are becoming recognized by its citizens as an increasingly important asset to the county's future growth and development. A growing interest is emerging in protecting the area's fragile resources while balancing the need for growth. The following discussion highlights the natural environmental limitations of Tattnall County.

According to the 1989 Hydrologic Atlas 18 of the Georgia Geologic Survey, Tattall County's significant groundwater recharge areas are contained within the Miocene/Pliocene – Recent Unconfined Aquifer system and are located primarily in the western half of the county, including the City of Reidsville, with several smaller areas located Beards Creek and the county's border with Long County to east and northeast of the City of Collins in the northern part of the county. A countywide ordinance modeled after the Georgia Department of Natural Resources' Part V Environmental Planning Criteria is in effect that includes standards for protecting groundwater recharge areas. A sizable portion of Tattall County (approximately 33 percent) has also been designated as wetlands on the National Wetlands Inventory prepared by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Much of the wetlands in the county are located along the Ochoopee and Altamaha rivers as well as major creeks such as Beards Creek, but not all of the wetlands in the county are confined to these areas. There are many areas of wetlands throughout the county, particularly in the eastern part of the county. These areas of the county are known to contain a variety of habitats of protected flora and fauna, including rare plants and animals.

The County also has two rivers, the Altamaha and the Ochoopee rivers, which are identified for protection under the 1991 River Corridor Protection Act. Both rivers are part of the Altamaha River Basin. The Ochoopee River, which forms the county's northwestern boundary and whose flow takes it near the City of Reidsville, flows into the Altamaha River, which forms the county's southern boundary. At 260 miles in length, the Altamaha River Basin is the second largest watershed with the second highest water flow on the East Coast. It is believed to be the largest free-flowing (unobstructed by dams) river on the East Coast. The Altamaha River was selected by the Nature Conservancy as its first bioreserve. In 1997 the Nature Conservancy completed a Conservation Plan to help protect the lower Altamaha River watershed. It is Georgia's largest river-swamp system and was designated by the Nature Conservancy in 1991 as one of the 75 "Last Great Places" remaining on Earth. The state-owned Big Hammock Wildlife Management Area is also located along the river in the southern section of Tattall County. This area contains approximately 6,177 acres of bottomed hardwoods with many oxbow lakes and sloughs, and it is a vital component to protecting the

quality of the river. Adjoining the area is a natural area that includes an 800-acre sand ridge with a variety of habitat types, including a cypress/gum forest and a turkey oak/longleaf pine forest. This natural area has been designated as a National Natural Landmark by the National Park Service because it is home to a number of rare plants and animals, including a large colony of the Georgia plume. A variety of hunting and fishing opportunities are located along the Altamaha River, making it very popular for recreational uses. Two boat landings are located along the Tattnall County side of the Altamaha River, J.E. Stanfield (located within the Big Hammock WMA) and Beard's Bluff (Adamson's Fish Camp), southwest of Glennville off of Georgia Highway 121/Georgia Highway 144/Georgia Highway 169, which offers the potential for tourism opportunities. There is also a boat landing on the Tattnall County side of the Ohoopsee River, known as the Tattnall County Landing. However, this landing is prone to dry up somewhat frequently. Development along the Ohoopsee and Altamaha rivers in Tattnall County has been minimal, generally limited to weekend hunting/fishing dwellings.


These resources are somewhat protected throughout Tattnall County under a model ordinance that was based on DNR's Part V Environmental Planning Criteria and adopted by the City of Glennville in 2000 and by all of the remaining local governments in the county in 2001. This ordinance provides for strict limitations on the use of land near these identified resources.

Two other environmental resources identified by DNR under the Part V Environmental Planning Criteria, water supply watersheds and protected mountains, are not present in Tattnall County and thus are not applicable.

#### **B. Criteria for Siting Solid Waste Facilities**

The County contracts with Sullivan Environmental Services for the collection and disposal of solid waste in the unincorporated areas. The cities of Collins, Glennville, Manassas, and Reidsville also contract with Sullivan Environmental Services for solid waste collection and disposal in their respective jurisdictions. Sullivan Environmental Services transports the solid waste it collects to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to the Broadhurst Environmental Landfill in Wayne County. The City of Cobbtown currently handles the collection and disposal of solid waste within its

jurisdiction, and the City is responsible for taking its solid waste to the Broadhurst Environmental Landfill for disposal. Because of the County's abundant natural resources and the intent of the County's Community Vision to utilize these resources in the County's future growth and development, the County does not believe that the location of any additional solid waste handling facilities would be compatible with the community's vision for its future growth and development.

While the cities of Glennville and Reidsville are the only local government in Tattnall County that have a zoning ordinance in place, the cities of Cobbtown, Collins, and Manassas and the unincorporated area of Tattnall County do have some land use regulations in place, such as subdivision regulations. There are several factors to be taken into consideration when determining the compatibility of solid waste handling facilities to the surrounding area. The Natural and Cultural Resources Element and other portions of the Tattnall County Joint Comprehensive Plan, as well as this Solid Waste Management Plan, identify areas where such a facility may or may not be acceptable. The County does not desire for such a facility to locate within a five (5) -mile radius of any of the municipalities. This will allow room for residential areas in and near the cities to grow and expand around the cities in those areas that are planned for future residential development. Simultaneously, it is desired that such facilities locate at a minimum of one-half mile from any residential area. This will lessen the possibility of adversely impacting adjacent properties through reduced property values or undue burdens on existing infrastructure.

Other considerations include airport safety. It is the County's intention that no solid waste handling facility locate within at least one (1) mile of the City of Reidsville Airport to ensure the safety of incoming and outgoing aircraft from interference caused by birds that might be attracted to the solid waste facility. Flood plains are another consideration. The County does not desire that such a facility locate in the 100-year flood plain. In fact, DNR Rule 391-3-4-.05 (1) (d) states that a facility cannot restrict the flow of the 100-year flood. Wetlands and river corridors are protected by the countywide ordinance based on DNR's Part V Environmental Planning Criteria. In addition, the County desires that no facility locate within two miles of the

state-owned Big Hammock Wildlife Management Area so as to ensure the protection of this important natural resource area. The County is also desirous of protecting the many and various natural streams that dot the area's landscape. It is desired by the County that no facility locate within one-half mile of any stream. Solid waste handling facilities are also discouraged from locating near any area of the county that is identified as prime farmland or as an area having either archaeological or historical significance. Fault areas, seismic impact zones, and unstable areas do not apply to Tattnall County.

### **C. Local Procedures for Siting Solid Waste Facilities**

As part of the site selection process, an applicant must prepare an engineering report detailing how the solid waste handling facility will comply with all applicable local, state, and federal regulations. The report must also discuss how the facility will be compatible with surrounding land uses and community facilities, including detailing the impact on roads and any required improvements, the uses of land in close proximity, adjacent properties, required water system improvements, wastewater management systems, and erosion control measures. It should also articulate information pertaining to the operation of the facility, such as the hours of operation, location and size of the facility, capacity, types of materials to be accepted, disposal fees, private or public usage, and number of employees.

Along with an engineering report, the applicant must prepare a Public Participation Plan. This plan will highlight to the County how the applicant will inform the public, businesses, and interested parties of the proposed facility. The plan must identify the order in which these parties will be notified and the manner in which such notification will be conducted. The County would then review the plan, and upon approval, the applicant would execute the plan and prepare a Public Participation Report that would document the results of the Public Participation Plan. A Public Hearing would then be held at the applicant's expense to solicit the views and concerns of local citizens.

Finally, the applicant must provide an Impact Statement and an Environmental Assessment prior to any action by the County or any public hearing. This is so that the proposed impact on the current solid waste

management infrastructure, collection capability and disposal capacity, and the County's ability to meet the State's per capita waste disposal reduction goal and the County's own 25 % per capita waste disposal reduction goal can be adequately addressed, along with the potential impact on the surrounding natural environment. The Impact Statement should also address compatibility of the project with the Tattnall County Joint Comprehensive Plan and this Solid Waste Management Plan. Upon the completion and submittal of all required documentation, public hearings, and public meetings, the County will then conduct a review and issue its findings as to the approval or rejection, based on all applicable local, state, and federal regulations, and compatibility with local plans, and shall issue a letter certifying the project's consistency with the County's Solid Waste Management Plan.

**D. Land Limitation Needs:**

1. There is a need to develop a formal application process with rules and procedures regarding solid waste handling facilities that are consistent with the newly updated Solid Waste Management Plan.

**Land Limitation Goals:**

1. Tattnall County seeks to create a formal application process that will insure that solid waste handling facilities are located in areas that are suitable for such facilities, are compatible with surrounding land uses, are in compliance with applicable local, state, and federal regulations, preserves the existing rural character and maintains/enhances the current quality of life while providing for compatible and quality future growth and development, prevents nuisances and uses disruptive to the community's plans and vision, and are not considered for location in areas that have been identified as unsuitable due to environmental or land use limitations.

**VIII. Education and Public Involvement Element**

**A. Existing Local Government Programs**

The local governments in Tattnall County have a couple of different programs to educate the public concerning solid waste management. Tattnall County has a limited recycling program that has been in existence since the late 1990s. The County has established three convenience center sites (one each in the cities of Collins, Glennville, and Reidsville) in which certain recyclable

items can be accepted and collected. Citizens countywide can bring certain recyclable items they may have and drop them off at any one of the convenience centers on a voluntary basis. Items that are accepted for recycling include batteries, furniture, tires, and white goods. The County and its municipalities have areas designated at the convenience centers for the collection of each of these items. Once a significant amount of batteries and white goods are collected, these items are collected by Sullivan Environmental Services and taken to the Evans County Transfer Station and then to the Broadhurst Environmental Landfill for proper disposal. Once a significant amount of tires are collected, they are collected by Ridge Recyclers, Inc. out of Johnston, South Carolina to be properly disposed. A roll-off container is available at each of the convenience centers to collect furniture. Sullivan Environmental Services takes the collected furniture and properly disposes of them. The County also has several drop-off sites to collect newspapers for recycling. The newspapers are collected by the Tattnall/Evans Service Center for proper disposal. Aside from these activities, the use of recycling by local citizens appears to be rather minimal at the present time. The County's small population and tax base has played a major role in the lack of current recycling activities. However, a need does exist for current programs to be expanded and for additional programs to be implemented.

The County utilizes the local media and various brochures and publications to promote increased recycling activities among the general public for various promotional efforts. Local citizens are provided literature on a periodic basis encouraging the use of the convenience centers. The City of Reidsville's Fire Department and Garden Club periodically distribute educational flyers and posters at various sites in the community and to the local schools. Tattnall County's schools are located within the cities of Collins, Glennville, and Reidsville, and the County's high school is located between Glennville and Reidsville. The County and all three cities work closely with the school system to provide educational programs and activities to students concerning recycling and waste reduction. Since the formation of recycling activities in the County, there has been a small increase in the use of recycling participation by the public. The lack of available resources due to the County's small tax base creates limits on the scope of any program that is

undertaken. There has been some interest at the local level about possibly restarting a local codes enforcement program through the Georgia Department of Natural Resources Scrap Tire Management Program to combat the problems of littering and illegal dumping countywide and to promote increased recycling activities. Such a program was in place but was dropped due to a lack of sufficient funding to continue the program. All of the county's municipalities would be covered by this program. In addition to enforcing the countywide codes ordinance, the local code enforcement officer would have the responsibility of educating the general public about proper solid waste management and source reduction. This is a potential avenue that merits some exploration by local officials. However, the lack of available funding at the state level currently presents a barrier to initiating such a program locally. The County recognizes the need to foster increased utilization of recycling activities countywide and will continue to pursue avenues to expand its recycling operations and increase its use by the local citizenry.

The local governments in Tattnall County do not currently participate in many local or regional public involvement programs. The cities of Glennville and Reidsville each have a Garden Club, and Glennville also has its own Beautification Committee. Tattnall County and the cities of Cobbtown, Collins, and Manassas currently do not participate in any regional or state programs at this time, but there is a need to do so in the future.

#### **B. Solid Waste Advisory Committee/Task Force**

This is not applicable currently in any of the local governments in Tattnall County. There are no plans to establish such a committee in the near future.

#### **C. School System Programs**

The only currently organized education program through the Tattnall County School System is that mentioned earlier. If a local codes enforcement program is initiated, a need exists for such a program to work closely with the local school system to provide pertinent education on recycling and other solid waste reduction activities to the county's young people.

#### **D. Litter Control Programs**

Tattnall County and most of its municipalities have previously utilized inmates from either the state prison facilities located in the county or community service inmates through local law enforcement to conduct roadside pickups and other cleanup methods. The City of Cobbtown utilizes state inmates once a year in December. The City of Glennville utilizes inmates from Smith State Prison in Glennville in addition to the City's street department. The City also utilizes volunteer efforts by such groups as the Girl Scouts, 4-H, the Glennville Garden Club, and the City's Beautification Committee from time to time. Tattnall County and the cities of Collins and Reidsville utilize community service efforts through local law enforcement. The City of Reidsville also utilizes the volunteer efforts of its volunteer fire department from time to time as well.

#### **E. Regional RDC Programs**

There currently are no RDC programs in effect in Tattnall County, nor are there any plans to establish a program(s) in the near future.

#### **F. Summary of Needs/Assessment**

The general priority needs as determined by the local governments for public education and involvement are as follows:

1. There is a need to reestablish an active codes enforcement program countywide with an emphasis on litter control, promoting the use of recycling; source reduction, and reuse where appropriate. Funding to develop a program, and to expand the program's scope as necessary, should be pursued.
2. There is a need to increase the promotion and utilization of recycling activities throughout Tattnall County.
3. There is a need to continue a recycling/waste reduction education program within the Tattnall County School System, in conjunction with an education program offered by a local codes enforcement program.
4. There is a need for Tattnall County and its municipalities to participate in local, regional, and state beautification activities.

## **G. Education and Public Involvement Goals**

1. Reestablish a countywide education and technical assistance program as a joint effort among Tattnall County and all municipalities in source reduction, reuse, recycling, and composting.
2. Support the continuation of educational programs within the Tattnall County School System concerning recycling and source reduction activities, and establish new programs as needed.
3. Increase the voluntary recycling and reduction opportunities for businesses and industries.
4. Increase participation in local, regional, and state beautification efforts, both in the incorporated and unincorporated areas, and form local programs as appropriate.

Our staff has reviewed the 2005 – 2014 Solid Waste Management Plan for Tattnall County and the cities of Cobbtown, Collins, Glennville, Manassas, and Reidsville and has determined it complies with the Minimum Planning Standards for Solid Waste Management. The following comment is intended as a recommendation:

- The per capita disposal amount is very low compared to statewide averages which may be attributed to lax reporting requirements. The local governments using Sullivan Environmental should require information on actual amounts collected for disposal from their jurisdictions.

To regain eligibility for solid waste permits, grants, and loans, Tattnall County and the cities of Cobbtown, Collins, Glennville, Manassas, and Reidsville must adopt the plan at their next scheduled meetings and forward a copy of the adoption resolutions to our office.

As soon as we receive notification that the County and cities have adopted the plan, we will send official notification of their renewed eligibility to receive solid waste permits, grants, and loans.


